

Volunteer Fire Depts



Teddy Bears Anonymous (TBA) is working together with SaskTel Pioneers to provide Saskatchewan Volunteer Fire Departments with teddy bears for children who are in need of a friend Teddy Bears Anonymous wishes to Thank Our Partners for supporting this great initiative 'video Global Regina'. We don't have access to hospitals which TBA do. Bears are sterilized, bagged, boxed, and shipped – the only way hospitals will accept. No one in that organization takes a salary, donations cover the cost of purchasing hundreds of thousands of bears. It took total teamwork and a cooperative effort of Saskatchewan's RCMP, Provincial Police Services, SaskTel, SaskTel Pioneers and Capital Ford Lincoln to make this possible. Teddy Bears Anonymous expanded our Teddy Bear program to include: 39 Victim Service Detachments in Saskatchewan. RCMP victim service deal – will accept 2000 bears from our partnership across 40 different detachments in SK.

SaskTel Corporate Community Challenge held in April/May to feed Saskatchewan families in need. Partnering with the 36 Food Banks within Saskatchewan. Thanks to all SaskTel employees who participated. Over \$60,000 was collected which will feed 1,218 families for a week (based on \$50/wk). Employees raised over \$35,900; SaskTel contributed \$25,000 and SaskTel Pioneers donated \$10,000. 

In its ninth year at the United Way, the SaskTel Pioneer Community Volunteer Income Tax Program (CVITP) clinic ran mostly virtually. Volunteers completed tax returns over the phone from their homes. In April a drop off from their homes. In April, a drop-off process was introduced to give taxpayers the option to drop off their information and get their taxes done within a few days.

During March and April, over 1,800 tax returns were completed. We did tax returns for over 1,600 individual taxpayers. Twentyfour hundred people benefited including over 800 children and close to 400 seniors. Since the end of April, we have been doing about 100 tax returns per month. In the last 3 years alone, we have completed close to 12,000 tax returns which delivered over forty-four million dollars in benefits to the people who need this money the most. Services provided by the clinic have become so well known that there is now demand for our services in all 12 months of the year.

The clinic could not continue to operate without the support of the HAD Allen club, and the Sales and Salvage group. We appreciate their moral, technical, and financial support.

We have close to 40 volunteers associated with the clinic but could always use more help. Knowing how to prepare tax returns is not a prerequisite.





SaskTel Employee Thrives in Supported Employment Program

Shea Mueller is part of the Supported Employment Program and has been a great fit for both SaskTel and the SaskTel Pioneers.



You might recognize Shea Mueller as a familiar face if you work at Regina's Head Office location. He has a knack for creative flair and he's using his skill set to help boost morale with the SaskTel Pioneers.

Shea is part of the Supported Employment Program. He was diagnosed with a form of autism spectrum disorder - a lifelong neuro-developmental disorder that affects communication and behavior - called Asperger's Syndrome, and like many others with the diagnosis, he is gifted in creativity.

One of his most recent projects for the Pioneers includes a monthly poem and cartoon contribution which is proving to boost morale and keep the SaskTel Pioneers community connected through social media. "I've pretty much always loved writing poems, drawing and colouring because I'm good at it, so this project has been really fun and enjoyable for me," Shea said.

The Supported Employment Program allows departments to work with Human Resources, Unifor, and external partners to provide an employment opportunity for an individual with a developmental disability in a way that meets the skill set of the individual.

"This program provides business value to the organization and creates meaningful employment opportunities for people with disabilities," said Sharon Davis, Human Resources Manager. "Shea has been with SaskTel for quite a few years and he is a great addition to our workforce."

Just by looking at his office walls, covered in drawings and poems created by himself and others, you can tell how passionate Shea is about putting his talents to use.

Pioneers Manager Darrell Liebrecht said he was quick to recognize Shea's creative abilities and knew this project would be a great fit for him.

Each month for the duration of the project Darrell posts a cartoon and poem that Shea creates to the Pioneers Facebook page.

"We actually posted his poem *Helping People* along with one of his cartoons on Facebook this month, and it sent a really great message about the importance of helping each other," Darrell said. "It was a great show of comradery for the Pioneers and it should stir up some more volunteer interest, which we need right now."

Bears to Hug

The Pioneers' Hug-A-Bear Project Continues to Bring Comfort

Figuratively speaking, the SaskTel Pioneers have held Saskatchewan communities in a caring and well-meaning bear hug for many years. It makes sense then that, conversely, the Hug-A-Bear project is one of the organization's most enduring initiatives!

The Hug-A-Bear project has been around for decades. It provides soft, cuddly bears for children who are in traumatic situations. These bears ride along with police and firefighters across Saskatchewan. The bears have also been spotted in hospitals and nursing homes, providing comfort and a reminder of the Pioneer spirit.

SaskTel Pioneers Mary Wilhelm has been a part of the program for more than 20 years. She is currently the coordinator for Hug-A-Bear work bees in Regina.

"There is a group of 10 of us that gather at the Pioneer Activity Centre to put the bears together," said Mary, who has long been retired from SaskTel but remains a Pioneer. "To make the little bears, it involves a lot of cutting material for the bodies, filling the bodies with stuffing and lots of sewing."

"As we know, we understand how important these bears will be for someone one day. But we manage to have a lot of fun getting together and making the bears."

Mary and her crew do an incredible job, creating about 200 bears every year.

"This is an important program for us, but also for children that are in a tough situation." said Darrell Liebrecht, Pioneer Manager. "I remember handing a Hug-A-Bear to a child at a house fire and seeing the look on the child's face showed me that our efforts are definitely worthwhile. For me, as a volunteer Fire Chief, it meant a lot knowing that our volunteers made that bear."

The Hug-A-Bears program will continue to bring comfort for many years to come.









Last year Prairie Council Pioneers donated \$9,982 to Ambulatory Care for the purchase of 2 vital signs monitors. Sara Cursons, Manager of Ambulatory Care in Regina. talks about the vital signs modules that now monitor Capnography (which measures adequacy of ventilation and respiratory rate). Certain invasive procedures that are typically provided in the operating room can now be safely performed in Ambulatory Care with the use of capnography during procedural sedation, resulting in faster recovery times and more cost effective services.

When a patient comes to Ambulatory Care, we are able to make what could be an unpleasant experience a lot more tolerable with the use of procedural sedation and analgesia. The combining of these medications; however, can lead to higher risk and potential life-threatening situations. Prior to receiving the new vital signs modules, we relied on pulse oximetry and nursing assessment. Capnography is a non-invasive way to continuously measure the respiratory rate, adequacy of ventilations, and the concentration of exhaled carbon dioxide in real time. A trained nurse can see the respiratory changes instantly. Pulse oximetry alone would not pick up on these changes right away because the average person has about a 3-5 minute reserve of oxygen in their lungs. With capnography, we are able to provide earlier interventions and decrease the incidence of oxygen desaturation during procedures performed under procedural sedation. It allows us to ensure safer care on our unit and allows patients to have a more enjoyable overall experience.

Thank you from the bottom of our hearts. These modules have made care safer when performing procedural sedation on our unit.

A Year for Caring

SaskTel Annual Report Highlights a Year of Caring and Connections

Hair today, gone...for a great cause! Daryl Godfrey exemplified the importance of caring this past year by shaving his head and raising funds for the Food Bank.



As SaskTel tables its 2020/2021 Annual Report, it serves as a time to reflect on the past year. Beyond the numbers and business aspects of such a document, we can also find SaskTel connecting with our customers in other ways. It's something captured nicely in the theme for this year's Annual Report which is 'A Year for Caring'.

Last year was a year like no other with the onset of COVID-19 causing turbulence and a healthy measure of uncertainty into our lives. Through it all, SaskTel was there to support and give back to our customers and to our communities. Beginning in March and continuing to September 2020, SaskTel offered our customers a range of initiatives to help them stay connected.

- Provided temporarily suspended collections activities and late payment fees for customers who were unable to pay their bills
 due to job loss or other financial hardship. The Crown Utility Payment Deferral Program was then introduced so customers
 could apply for relief when the time came to resume payments on their accounts.
- provided unlimited wireless data to its customers from 17 Dec 2020 to 11 Jan 2021. Data overage charges were waived for business and consumer customers on SaskTel's postpaid wireless data plans, noSTRINGS Prepaid wireless plan, and Sask-Tel fusion Internet plans. Customers on unlimited wireless plans were not subject to speed reductions.
- waived data overage charges from 17 Mar to 08 Jun 2020. to assist customers with on-line learning and working remotely during the pandemic.
- provided its maxTV service and maxTV Stream customers with access to additional news and entertainment channels to help keep them informed and their families entertained.

An important part of the SaskTel story is our support for non-profit and charitable organizations. That support continued throughout the pandemic, as these organizations stepped up to assist our most vulnerable and those struggling due to layoffs or other hardships. SaskTel contributed \$2,502,632 to 308 non-profit and charitable organizations, community associations, venues, events, and partnerships in 70 communities throughout the province. Included in that was a \$25,000 donation to the Food Banks of Saskatchewan Crisis Response Fund to help them meet growing demand for their services. Also making contributions to the Food Banks were the Pioneers who raised \$28,500, and SaskTel employees who donated \$675. Additionally, SaskTel's Chief Technology Officer Daryl Godfrey raised \$4,755 in employee donations for shaving his head!

In addition, SaskTel TelCare contributed nearly \$230,000 to 65 locally operated charities and non-profit organizations in 2020, which happened to be the program's 70th year of giving back.

Even though it wasn't possible to accumulate the usual amount of volunteer hours due to gathering size restrictions, the SaskTel Pioneers continued to deliver for our province. Members contributed \$281,313 in financial donations, and programs such Hug-A-Bears and Books for Literacy saw a huge increase in items donated. In response to COVID-19, the Pioneers made masks and distributed more than 3,900 of them across the province.

With an increased demand for on-line communications, the Be Kind Online program was more important than ever in 2020/21. The program was uniquely positioned to remind everyone that kindness matters more than ever. The initiative's focus on the prevention of bullying and cyber bullying took on a wider scope in uncertain times, offering different ways to cope with anxiety and various initiatives and campaigns to promote caring, support, and connections on-line.

These are but a few of many ways SaskTel and its employees made it a Year of Caring for our customers and our communities this past year. While the pandemic is still with us, there's optimism for better days around the corner, and SaskTel will continue to serve the communications needs of the people of our province while giving back to the communities we serve.

Kind Hearts and Fresh Starts SaskTel Social Causes are a Source of Pride!



In 2021 SaskTel celebrated two social causes.

Phones for Fresh Start is a cellular recycling program that demonstrates being green can benefit far more than just the environment. With cell phones containing components made from many precious metals and rare-earth elements, and the devices being more than 95% recyclable, recycling is a business model that makes dollars and good sense.

Partnering with the Provincial Association of Transition Houses and Services Saskatchewan (PATHS), SaskTel collects unwanted cell phones for recycling and sends them for processing. SaskTel then uses those proceeds to purchase new cell phones and prepaid phone cards for distribution to those fleeing domestic violence through one of 21 participating PATHS Shelters.

To date, SaskTel has recycled well over 122,638 wireless phones (and counting!). All proceeds from the recycling process have been used to donate \$96,000 in prepaid phone cards and nearly 4,000 wireless phones for distribution across 21 PATHS agencies in the province.

SaskTel acknowledges that the products and services we sell may be used to conduct bullying activities. **Be Kind Online brings awareness and education to cyberbullying and cyber safety.** It also serves as a reminder that we all have an obligation to not only monitor our on-line behavior, but to also share in the opportunity to spread positivity.

Be Kind Online also offers a grant program for our youth. Saskatchewan's Ministry of Education has partnered with Be Kind Online to provide grants of up to \$1,000 for youth-led initiatives to address bullying and cyberbullying within our province. The goal is to empower youth to take action in their communities to spread kindness, positivity, and connectedness. The grant provides youth the opportunity to collaborate with others to find solutions to stop bullying and inspire others to do the same.

SaskTel TelCare donates more than \$3,000 to Hunger in Moose Jaw

Normally, the Pioneers purchased the gifts up front (to alleviate employees needing to be out shopping) and then request donations from employees who wish to participate. Gifts are approximately \$25 for each child. Funds donated by SaskTel Salvage helped us immensely this past year.

Since Santa can't go to the schools last year, the gifts were shipped to the schools along with a video message from Santa that was played to each class as they received their gifts."

In Saskatoon, the program works a bit differently, with a primary focus on seniors and care homes.

"With the pandemic, the need is much greater this year," said Dione Wall who coordinates the program in Saskatoon. "Seniors are lonelier than ever, and since about half of our staff is working from home, we don't have as much capacity to purchase the gifts. We had a total of 263 requests for seniors last year."



Saskatoon employees picked up their angels, shopped for the gift, then wrapped them and forwarded to Dione. The seniors received their gift Christmas morning.

"The seniors who are receiving the gifts are those who are utterly without family and friends, and therefore will otherwise not receive a gift on Christmas morning. This act of kindness is equally special for SaskTel employees.

This year's event kept 23 volunteers busy sorting and distributing 22,600 books.



The non-profit organization, First Book Canada, works with schools, libraries and other partners across the country to ensure that all children can have access to new, high-quality books. According to statistics from First Book Canada 25% of Canadian households don't own a single book. Additionally, studies show that poor educational outcomes, including low literacy rates, are tied to future poverty, unemployment, illness, and crime.

This is the eighth year the SaskTel Pioneers in Regina worked together with First Book Canada to help donate new resources to Saskatchewan youth. The books were distributed to registered organizations from around the province, representing both the Public and Catholic School Boards, as well as some private schools, in addition to many service organizations the support finance challenged families such as United Way and KidsFirst.

"These distributions are critical to help with youth literacy rates and without volunteers we just wouldn't be able to get the job done," said Tom Best, Executive Director of First Book Canada. "Jolene is amazing and has been remarkable from the beginning. I felt a bit guilty not being there this year, but I think Jolene could run this event with her eyes closed! Mason is also a very diligent worker and we are very thankful for his contributions."

Jolene retired from SaskTel in 2014, but is thankful for the many volunteer opportunities she continues to have with the SaskTel Pioneers. It's an experience she's happy to pass on to her family.

YOUR WILL

including Power of Attorney and Living Will (or Health Care Directive)

Your will is one of the most important documents you need to store safely, since it directs how your assets will be distributed when you pass away. If you don't have a will, the government will decide how your estate will be divided based on certain formulas, which may not match your wishes. Getting it prepared and executed with a lawyer not a DIY (do it yourself) is important. Also if you move to a new province, you should have it reviewed by a lawyer in your new province.

A enduring **POWER OF ATTORNEY** allows you to name someone to be in charge of making decisions for you if you become incapacitated. You may choose to name a separate **power of attorney for medical decisions** (via a Health Care Directive) and **financial power of attorney** for financial decisions. A Health Care power of attorney works hand-in-hand with a **living will** to ensure that your wishes regarding medical treatment are followed.

A Living Will or Health Care Directive is a legal document in which you name someone to communicate with medical personnel regarding your treatment preferences should you become incapacitated or otherwise unable to express your preferences yourself. Issues addressed in living wills generally include breathing tubes, feeding tubes, and other life-sustaining medical treatments. A List of Your Investments

Maintain a readily accessible list of your bank savings (both registered and non-registered), stocks, bonds, pensions and life insurance policies. Also, you may consider naming beneficiaries for your registered accounts such as TFSAs, RSPs and RIFs. The assets can then be transferred to your beneficiary or beneficiaries on your passing, without having to go through your estate. However this should be discussed with your financial advisor or accountant as naming someone other than your spouse on your RRSP/RRIF may have unintended tax consequences and isn't always the best solution for your estate.

Real Estate Titles and Deeds

It's important to safely store the title and deed to any property you own. Your principal residence is exempt from capital gains tax at the time of transfer to a beneficiary. But other real estate left to someone other than your spouse or common-law partner is deemed to have been disposed of at its fair market value. If it's gone up in value since the time of purchase, the increase must be reported as a capital gain on your final tax return.

Property deeds, vehicle titles, official certificates (birth, marriage, etc.), the contact information for your attorney, insurance broker, doctor—all of these are things you can gather and put in the same, safe place now to make it easier for your loved ones later. make sure your beneficiaries are up to date. Any time your family situation changes is a good time to review your beneficiaries and estate plan.

Talk With your Loved Ones and Keep Everything current

Make sure at least one other person, preferably your executor(s), knows where your documents are kept and has access to these documents after your death. The clearer you are while you are alive, the fewer problems they will have, as they won't have to guess your intentions. We highly recommend that you contact a lawyer to help you with this process.

Six Years of Tax Returns

The Canada Revenue Agency (CRA) recommends that you keep past tax returns for 6 years. Given your executor is responsible for filing your final income tax return, having access to your previous returns will help them gather the information they need.
